

HANDWASHING FOR CENTRAL VENOUS LINE (CVL) CARE



Why is handwashing important?

Your child or teen could develop a very serious infection if germs like bacteria or viruses get into the CVL or port.

Hand washing:

- is the most important part of sterile (aseptic) technique
- prevents the spread of germs from your hands to the CVL or port
- will clean your hands, but will not remove all the germs your hands will not be sterile, so you must still be careful when handling equipment.

Remember!

Germs like bacteria and viruses can grow:

- on a bar of soap
- in liquid soap



You can still use bar soap and liquid soap to wash your hands, but you'll need to make sure to:

- rinse bar soap before washing your hands with it
- rinse the inside of liquid soap bottles carefully before you refill them

What you need

- running hot and cold water
- soap in a liquid pump or bar soap
- paper towel or a fresh cloth towel

Steps	Key points
1. Remove all jewelry and watches. Roll up shirt sleeves.	• It is difficult to remove all the germs caught on rings, watches and bracelets.
2. Turn on the water and adjust the temperature and flow.	Water that is too hot or too cold water can irritate the skin.
3. Wet hands and forearms.	• It is easier to lather the soap if your hands and forearms are wet.



4.	Apply soap over hands, wrists and forearms. Scrub vigorously for 1 full minute starting at fingers, between the fingers, over the palms, the back of the hands, wrists and forearms (in a circular motion).	•	Always work from the cleanest (fingers) to the dirtiest (forearms), never returning to an area just scrubbed. Friction is very important when hand washing.
5.	Rinse hands and forearms (one at a time).	•	Rinse well to remove all of the soap residue.
		•	Hold the hands up after rinsing so that the water will not run down to the hands, which could carry bacteria to this clean area.
6.	Dry your hands (one at a time) with a paper or fresh cloth towel.	•	Use a patting motion to dry hands and dry the same way you washed, starting with the fingers and hands, and working up to the forearm.
		•	Your hands must be completely dry so that the supplies do not become wet.
		•	It is difficult to put on sterile gloves if your hands are still wet.
7.	Turn off the taps with the paper or cloth towel. If you use a cloth towel it should be washed before being used again.	•	The taps are considered dirty. Don't touch them with your hands once they have been washed.

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
